Comprehensive implementation plan on maternal, infant and young child nutrition

- Progress in target achievement (2016)

- Stunting 155 million
- Anemia 33%
- LBW 15%
- Overweight 41 million
- Breastfeeding 40%
- Wasting 52 million



- 182 countries include in their policies and plans goals aligned to the global nutrition targets for 2025
- 148 countries are providing breastfeeding counselling; 111 countries are implementing the Baby-friendly Hospital Initiative;
- US\$ 3.4 billion were pledged at N4G
- Global Nutrition Monitoring Framework completed (21 indicators)

International code of marketing of breast-milk substitutes and guidance on ending the inappropriate promotion of foods for infants and young children

- Albania, Mongolia and Thailand have adopted new legal measures to strengthen implementation and monitoring of the International Code of Marketing of Breast-milk Substitutes
