PRIZES AWARDED AND RESEARCH PROJECT FUNDING

◆ Professors Huang and Panizza win CICF Best Paper Award

CFD members **Yi Huang** and **Ugo Panizza**, together with Prof. **Marco Pagano**, from the University of Naples Federico II, have been awarded the China International Conference in Finance Best Paper Award for their paper “Public Debt and Private Firm Funding: Evidence from Chinese Cities”. The authors find that in China, local public debt issuance between 2006 and 2013 crowded out investment by private manufacturing firms by tightening their funding constraints, while it did not affect state-owned and foreign firms.

In Chapter 1 (in *The Factory-Free Economy: Outsourcing, Servitization and the Future of Industry*, ed. by Lionel Fontagné and Ann Harrison, Oxford University Press, 2017), **Richard Baldwin** describes the changing nature of globalisation as shifting the drivers from lower transport costs and tariffs which made it possible to concentrate production and exports in the North, to ICT innovations which allow manufacturing to be dispersed and sent to low-wage countries.
