Weaving the World: Exercises in Writing Evocative Ethnography

ANSO136- Spring - 6 ECTS Schedule & Room

Course Description

The aim of this course is to introduce students to the fundamental features and essential practices of writing ethnography. The primary objective of the course is to show students how to sensuously describe ethnographic spaces, sounds and characters. In the course, students will also learn what distinguishes ethnography from other forms of academic and nonfiction representation.

Students will engage in writing exercises that enable them to "Weave the World," a seamless linkage of ethnographic description and social analysis. Students will also be asked to read examples from the work of ethnographers who have, in various ways, successfully used « weaving the world » techniques to evoke places and spaces, develop dialogue and craft character. By the end of the course, students will have practiced writing strategies that they can use to ensure that their future readers come to know a people who live in a particular place.

During the course students will be asked to write culture evocatively. The instructor will outline ethnographic writing practices—the "tricks of the trade." He will then ask the students to begin to "Weave the World" by writing (1) descriptions of space/place, dialogues, and character portraits and (2) combine those elements into a detailed ethnographic essay that captures, in prose, the texture of place/space, dialogue and characters in an ethnographic setting.

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Syllabus:

Evaluation will be based on the following objectives:

- Students will be expected to actively participate in all class activities; to read and discuss assigned readings; and to engage in constructive critiques of one another's draft essays.
- Students will complete a 5-10-page paper evoking space, presenting dialogue, and crafting a character portrait. At the end of the course they will submit 15-20-page ethnographic essay (in American Anthropological Association Format) that combines elements of place/space, dialogue, and character—a piece of evocative ethnographic writing.
- Students will write/produce an roughly 850 word blog or op-ed using their anthropological skills and expertise to reflect on issues of current concern (systemic racism, income and health inequities, religious intolerance, or climate change, among many others).

Specific Evaluation Criteria:

- 1. Presentation/Discussion of assigned readings 10%
- 2. Essay that evokes space/place 10%
- 3. Ethnographic Dialogue Piece 10%
- 4. Ethnographic Character Portrait 10%
- 5. Blog 10 %
- 6. An evocative essay combining elements of space/place, dialogue, and character 50%
