# MONIRUL AZAM

Associate Professor in Law, Södertörn University; Adjunct Faculty in Intellectual Property Law, Stockholm University



Monirul Azam is an Associate Professor in Law at the Södertörn University, Stockholm, and Adjunct Faculty in Intellectual property (IP) law at the department of law, Stockholm University. He is the founder and director of StockholmIP and Sustainable Development Consulting. Much of his academic research, consulting and teaching experience has been oriented around today's most crucial sustainable development policy questions at the intersection of IP law and public health, IP and climate change, IP and technology transfer, climate vulnerability of the Least Developed Countries (LDCs) and capacity building under the climate change and environmental law. He holds a PhD

in IP law from the University of Bern, and an LLM in IP. He obtained a diploma in Computer Studies from Singapore, and LLB (Hons) and LLM at the University of Chittagong (Bangladesh). He worked as JSPS-UNU postdoctoral fellow at the United Nations University Institute for the Advanced Study of Sustainability for around two years in role of intellectual property and environmental law for achieving the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals. Dr. Azam worked at the Stockholm University as Associate Professor in IP Law between 2018-2019. He developed and taught IP and sustainable development to master's students as a course director and supervised undergraduate and postgraduate theses in IP law at the University during five years. He taught IP Law at the Uppsala University, Linköping University, and several other Swedish universities as a guest faculty for several years. He worked at the University of Chittagong as Associate Professor of law for several years and taught and supervised undergraduate and postgraduate students in the field of IP and commercial law. He acted as a trainer and resource person in IP law and sustainable development to train mid-level and high-level governmental officials from more than thirty developing countries and the LDCs as part of the WIPO-SIDA-PRV training programme and other programmes at the Swedish IP office for the last ten years. Dr. Azam has presented in numerous international conferences, workshops, and training programmes as an invited speaker and has also extensively published papers in peerreviewed international journals in the field of intellectual property law and environmental law.
