MASTER IN DEVELOPMENT STUDIES SPECIALISATION TRACK MOBILITIES, SPACES AND CITIES

INTERDISCIPLINARY MASTERS

This specialisation track focuses on the crosscutting challenges associated with the flows and mobilities of peoples, goods, capital, technology, ideas and information.

The track will advance students' knowledge and analytical capacity to address:

- → The multiple drivers of mobilities, including demography, education, agrarian transition, technology, inequality and discrimination, conflict, environmental change, information and communication revolution.
- → The governance of these mobilities by governments, international organisations, the private sector, civil society, faith-based organisations, etc.
- → The spaces in which they occur, including cities, rural areas, special economic zones, migration routes, humanitarian areas, etc. and how these are transformed, interconnected, fragmented.
- → The uneven consequences of these dynamics on professionals material life and social aspirations of communities and individuals.

Students can choose between two required core courses in this specialisation: one on Cities, Conflict and Development, or one on Migration, Mobility and Development. The first required course explores the relationship between cities and development, focusing specifically on the issues of urban violence, inequality, and conflict. The second required course engages with the complex relationship between migration, mobility and development in the context of globalisation.

A capstone project forms an integral part of the specialisation track allowing students to get involved with a key actor or institution, producing an applied research project.
