RESEARCH PROFILE

My research focuses on the gendered entanglements of health and illness drawing simultaneously on theories of the body and society through time and critical epistemologies of global health. The intersection of anthropological renderings of the body, gender and the international arena of global health interventions is a relatively new field of scholarly inquiry in which I explicitly bridge academia with policy and practice of health interventions. My research field sites have included ethnographic studies in the UK (London and Newmarket) and Ireland; observational and primary data collection in Nepal, Peru and Mozambique; and, intervention studies in Malawi. Present and future work explores the gendered dimensions of the digitalization of health, building on earlier work I conducted on ageing in digital landscapes. This work circles back to the academy through my active participation in the Royal Anthropological Institute Committee on Policy and Practice.

In this role, I was the post-doc anthropologist in a nested, hospital-based ethnography within a Randomised Control Trial of clinical decision-making around diagnosis of angina and chest pain in east London clinics. This interdisciplinary study with technologists, software designers, cardiologists, cardiothoracic surgeons, epidemiologists and social scientists led to the co-development of a bedside decision making tool for use in Rapid Chest Pain Clinics to diagnose the cause of chest pain beyond the epistemological canon to include expressions of symptoms that were inclusive of the socio-cultural and linguistic communities of east London. The diagnostic canon for chest pain was originally developed in the 1950s in the USA among (mainly white) male military veterans. This research upturned the assumptions of the diagnostic canon to diversity the taxonomy to include, for example, Bengali descriptions of “heavy heart” as part of the diagnostic lexicon.
