Irene Akua Agyepong is a Foundation fellow and member of the Faculty Board of the Public Health Faculty of the Ghana College of Physicians and Surgeons. She was Ghana Health Service Regional Director of Health for the Greater Accra region 2004 to 2012, chair of the Board of Health Systems Global (2012 – 2014) and Professor Prince Claus Chair in Development and Equity, University Medical Centre, Utrecht in the Netherlands (2008 – 2010). She has been Chair of the Scientific and Technical Advisory Committee (STAC) of the Alliance for Health Policy and Systems Research. She was awarded the Arnold Kaluzny distinguished alumni award of the Public Health Leadership program of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 2008. She has an MBChB (1986) from the University of Ghana Medical School; a Masters in Community Health (1991) from the University of Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine; and a Doctor of Public Health (2000) from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.



David Heymann

Medical epidemiologist and Professor of Infectious Disease Epidemiology at LSHTM

David Heymann is a medical epidemiologist and Professor of Infectious Disease Epidemiology at LSHTM. From 1989 to 2009 he held various leadership positions in infectious diseases at WHO, and in 2003 headed the WHO global response to SARS in his role as executive director of communicable diseases. In 1976, after spending two years working in India on smallpox eradication, he was a member of the CDC (Atlanta) team to investigate the first Ebola outbreak in DRC and stayed on in sub-Saharan Africa for 13 years in various field research positions on Ebola, monkeypox (Mpox), Lassa Fever, malaria and other tropical diseases after which he was seconded by CDC to WHO. He has published over 275 peer reviewed articles and book chapters, is editor of the Control of Communicable Diseases Manual, and is an elected member of the UK Academy of Medical Sciences and the US National Academy of Medicine. In 2009 he was named an Honorary Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire for services to global health.



Dr Francisco F Songane

Member of the Governing Council of the Africa Public Health Foundation

Dr Francisco F Songane, former minister of Health of Mozambique (2000-2004), has had an extensive involvement in the international community that has included serving as Executive Committee member and board member of Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunization (GAVI, The Vaccine Alliance). He was also a member of Task Force 4 of the UN Millennium Project (2002-2004), analysing the practicalities of achieving the goals related to maternal and child health, a member of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee of the International Vaccine Institute, and served in several Advisory Committees. He was the Founding Director of the Partnership for Maternal, New-born and Child Health (PMNCH) hosted at WHO, and later Chair of the Forum 2012 on Research for Health organized by the Council on Health Research for Development, where he served as senior Health Advisor. Further, he was UNICEF Representative in Angola from July 2013 to October 2016 where he was directly involved in the efforts to tackle a major yellow fever epidemic, the worst in the last decade that became a global public health threat. Since April 2020, he is member of the council of the Africa Public Health Foundation, a foundation set up to mobilize resources for Africa CDC. He was also the Interim CEO for Africa Public Health Foundation from December 2020 to May 2023. Dr. Songane trained as a medical doctor and obstetrician / gynaecologist at the Eduardo Mondlane University and Maputo Central Hospital in Maputo, Mozambique as well as at St. James University Hospital in Leeds, England. He has a Master of Public Health degree from Boston University and Master of Science in Financial Economics from the University of London, England.



Walaiporn Patcharanarumol

Director, Global Health Division, Ministry of Public Health, Thailand and Researcher, Health Financing and UHC, International Health Policy Program (IHPP), Ministry of Public Health, Thailand

Walaiporn Patcharanarumol is a pharmacist by training. She has become a researcher on health financing. She won a scholarship of Joint-Japan World Bank for her master study in Social Protection Financing at Maastricht University, Netherlands during 2002-2003. Subsequently, she was awarded the Dorothy Hodgkin Postgraduate Award in 2004 from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, University of London for her PhD in Public Health and Policy. She was on secondment at Health System Financing Department, Health Service System Cluster, World Health Organization, Geneva, Switzerland, during 2011 – 2012 funded by the Thai Government through the Prince Mahidol Award Foundation. In 2019, she was awarded the prestigious Senior Research Scholar award from the Thailand Research Fund to strengthen Thailand's research capacity on health policy and system for improving Thai Universal Health Coverage (UHC) through collective research work and strengthening capacity of young researchers. During 2019-2021, she served as the Board of the Alliance for Health Policy and Systems Research which its work contributes to health policy and systems research initiatives at national and international levels. Her main research areas include UHC, health financing, health systems, health policy and global health and her scholarly contributions include 154 international and domestic publications.

Professor of Public Health and Deputy Vice-Chancellor for Research and Innovation at the University of KwaZulu-Natal.

Mosa Moshabela (MBChB, MMed, MSc, PhD) is the Chairperson of the Governing Board at the National Research Foundation (NRF), Member of the Board at the South African Medical Research Council (SAMRC), Chairperson of the Standing Committee on Health in the Academy of Science of South Africa (ASSAf), Health Commissioner to the Premier of KwaZulu-Natal, as one of the seven multi-sector commissioners on the Premier's Provincial Planning Commission. he was awarded PHILA Annual Award (2022) by the Public Health Association of South Africa (PHASA) for his contribution to Public Health in South Africa, and a Ministerial Special Covid-19 Award (2020 - 2021) for Covid-19 Science Communication and Public Engagement. Primarily, his contribution has been in the improvement of access and quality in healthcare to combat infectious diseases, in relation to HIV and TB, and in the areas of health systems, services and policy research. Prof Moshabela is now focused on implementation science, which cuts across multiple disciplines, and involves the design, implementation, and evaluation of complex interventions in healthcare services and programs, and seeks to improve access, quality, and equity in healthcare, for resource-poor settings in sub-Saharan Africa.



Richard Horton

Editor-in-Chief, *The Lancet*

Richard Horton is Editor-in-Chief of *The Lancet*: He qualified in physiology and medicine with honours from the University of Birmingham in 1986. He joined *The Lancet* in 1990, moving to New York as North American Editor in 1993. In 2016, he chaired the Expert Group for the High-Level Commission on Health Employment and Economic Growth, convened by Presidents Hollande of France and Zuma of South Africa. From 2011 to 2015, he was co-chair of the UN's independent Expert Review Group on Information and Accountability for Women's and Children's Health. In 2011, he was elected a Foreign Associate of the US Institute of Medicine and, in 2015, he received the Friendship Award from the Government of China. In 2019, he was awarded the WHO Director-General's Health Leaders Award for outstanding leadership in global health and the Roux Prize in recognition of innovation in the application of global health evidence. In 2021, he received the Physicians for Human Rights Award in recognition of extraordinary leadership in advancing health and human rights. He now works to develop the idea of planetary health – the health of human civilizations and the ecosystems on which they depend. In 2020, he published The COVID-19 Catastrophe: What's Gone Wrong and How to Stop It Happening Again. A revised, updated, and expanded second edition was published in 2021. As part of the UK's 2023 Honours, Dr Horton was awarded the Order of the British Empire (OBE) in recognition for services to Health and Medical Journalism.



Atul Gawande

Assistant Administrator for Global Health

Dr Atul Gawande is the Assistant Administrator for Global Health. He is a renowned surgeon, writer, and public health leader. Prior to joining the Biden-Harris Administration, he was a practicing general and endocrine surgeon at Brigham and Women's Hospital and a professor at Harvard Medical School and the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. He was founder and chair of Ariadne Labs, a joint centre for health systems innovation, and of Lifebox, a non-profit making surgery safer globally. He also co-founded CIC Health, a public benefit corporation supporting pandemic response operations nationally, and served as a member of the Biden transition COVID-19 Advisory Board. From 2018-2020, he was CEO of Haven, the Amazon, Berkshire Hathaway, and JPMorgan Chase healthcare venture. In addition, Atul was a long-time staff writer for The New Yorker magazine and has written four New York Times best-selling books: Complications, Better, The Checklist Manifesto, and Being Mortal. He is a member of the National Academy of Medicine and the winner of two National Magazine Awards, Academy Health's Impact Award for highest research impact on healthcare, a MacArthur Fellowship, and the Lewis Thomas Award for writing about science.



Agnès Soucat

Director Health and Social Protection, French Development Agency (AFD), Paris

Agnès Soucat is the Director of Health and Social Protection, at French Development Agency, (AFD) in Paris. Previously, she was the Director for Health Systems, Governance and Financing at WHO in Geneva, Switzerland. Before joining WHO, she was Global Health Lead Economist at the World Bank and the Director for Human Development, for the African Development Bank, where she was responsible for health, education, social protection and employment for Africa, including fifty-four countries in the continent. She has, over thirty years of experience, in health and poverty reduction, covering more than seventy countries in Africa, Asia and Europe. She is a pioneer of several innovations in health financing, including community-based financing and performance-based financing. She was a main author of the World Development Report, "Making Services Work for Poor People"(2004), the Lancet Commission reports, "Global Health 2035: a world converging within a generation" (2011) and "Planetary Health: Safeguarding human health in the Anthropocene epoch" (2015), and "The labor market for health workers in Africa: a new look at the crisis," (2013). Soucat holds an MD and a Master's in Nutrition, from the University of Nancy in France, as well as a MPH and PhD, in Health Economics from the Johns Hopkins University. She is currently Senior Associate at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore (USA)



Kalipso Chalkidou

Head of Health Finance, Global Fund

Kalipso Chalkidou is the founding Head of the Department of Health Finance at the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria. Dr Chalkidou leads the development and implementation of an overarching health financing strategy for the Global Fund, expanding and coordinating the work of health financing specialists, reinforcing advocacy and support to countries, and deepening collaboration with partners. Prior to the Global Fund, Dr Chalkidou was Director of Global Health Policy and a Senior Fellow at the Center for Global Development, based in London. Dr Chalkidou founded NICE International which she led for 8 years, and, more recently, of the international Decision Support Initiative (iDSI) which she directs and which is a multi-million multi-country network working towards better health around the world through evidence-informed spending in healthcare in low to middle income countries.

President of Resilient Health Systems and a Senior Associate at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health

Dr Olusoji (Soji) Adeyi is the President of Resilient Health Systems and a Senior Associate at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. He is the author of the book entitled "Global Health in Practice: Investing Amidst Pandemics, Denial of Evidence, and Neo-dependency." Previously at the World Bank, Dr Adeyi served as Director of the Health, Nutrition, and Population Global Practice, among other leadership responsibilities across the world. He was the founding Director of the Affordable Medicines Facility for malaria (AMFm) at the Global Fund. He has led initiatives on global and regional health policies, strategies, and programs; authored many papers and books on health policy and systems; and co-led multiple partnerships and commissions in health. Justin is co-chair of UHC2030, the international multistakeholder partnership for universal health coverage. He is a member of multiple WHO expert panels, including for the Universal Health Preparedness Review, and on HIV, viral hepatitis and STIs. He is Honorary Professorial Fellow at The George Institute for Global Health, and Adjunct Associate Professor at the Kirby Institute, University of New South Wales. At a national level, Justin is President of ACON (formerly AIDS Council of New South Wales), Australia's largest civil society organisation working on HIV prevention, care and support, and the health of sexuality and gender-diverse people more broadly. He is a former chair of the New South Wales Gay and Lesbian Rights Lobby, the peak advocacy body for gay and lesbian people in that state. Justin Koonin's work spans a diverse range of sectors. In addition to his efforts in health and human rights, he has worked as a postdoctoral researcher in mathematics at the University of Sydney, as a data scientist at PwC, and (currently) as a fund manager at Allan Gray. He holds a Ph.D. in Pure Mathematics from the University of Sydney, and is a Chartered Financial Analyst charter holder, as well as a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.
