THIRD COUNTRIES AND G7'S SANCTIONS: DECOUPLING RISKS AND STREAMLINING COMPLIANCE

Since Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, sanctions have become a key instrument of international pressure. Yet as restrictions expand, so do the methods to evade them. This year, **StateWatch** analyzed sanctions circumvention through Turkey, Hong Kong, jointly with **Liberal Democracy League of Ukraine** conducted research on how South Korea succeeded in reducing sanctions evasion, and together with **Sanctions Finder** conducted a series of webinars for business. Drawing on this research and workshops with practitioners from Georgia, Turkey, and the Philippines, the session will share insights on how third countries interpret and implement G7 sanctions, and what this reveals about the effectiveness of the global sanctions regime.
