## Professor Suerie Moon

Co-Director, Global Health Centre, Geneva Graduate Institute



Professor Moon seeks to combine academically rigorous research and analysis with policy relevance and impact. Her work is broadly concerned with the intersection of global governance and public health. Her theoretical contributions to the field include conceptualizing the global health system, defining the functions the system must perform to adequately protect public health, global public goods for health, and identifying the types of governance gaps and power disparities that contribute to health inequity. She has developed specialized policy expertise on how to achieve more globally equitable innovation and access to medicines; strengthen the global governance of outbreak preparedness and response; make trade, investment and intellectual property rules more health-sensitive; and address perennial weaknesses in development assistance for health. Her current research projects focus on the international sharing of outbreak-prone pathogens and related benefits, and new business models of pharmaceutical R&D. She also directs the Knowledge Network on Innovation and Access to Medicines, a project that aims to maximize the contributions of research and analysis to strengthening the pharmaceutical innovation system, a topic she has researched for over twenty years.

Prior to joining the Graduate Institute in 2016, she was Lecturer on Global Health at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. She was Study Director of the Harvard-LSHTM Independent Panel on the Global Response to Ebola, head of Harvard's research team on the Lancet Commission on Global Governance for Health, and co-directed the Project on Innovation and Access to Technologies for Sustainable Development at the Kennedy School of Government. She also co-founded and led the Forum on Global Governance for Health, a focal point at the university for research, debate and strategic convening on issues at the intersection of global governance and health. She has continued to teach and advise doctoral students as adjunct Lecturer at the Harvard Chan School.

Her work has been published in leading academic journals and covered in mainstream media. Professor Moon speaks regularly at academic conferences, government and intergovernmental meetings, legislative hearings, and civil society convenings. She has served on a number of expert advisory bodies and boards, including most recently as Secretary of the Board of Directors of the Drugs for Neglected Diseases initiative, WHO Fair Pricing Forum Advisory Group, Expert Advisory Group to the UN Secretary General's High-Level Panel on Access to Medicines, Proposal Review Committee of UNITAID, and US National Academies of Medicine Forum on Antimicrobial Threats. She is currently the Principal Investigator on three research projects, and the recipient of a PRIMA grant from the Swiss National Science Foundation. She received a BA in history from Yale, an MPA in international relations from Princeton, and PhD in public policy from the Harvard Kennedy School of Government.

## **Daniela Morich**

Head of Policy Engagement and of the Global Health Platform, Global Health Centre



Daniela Morich presently serves as the Head of Policy Engagement and Global Health Platform at the Global Health Centre of the Geneva Graduate Institute. She maintains active collaborations with diverse research institutes and non-profit organisations, particularly in the realms of environmental and climate change law. At the International Institute for Sustainable Development (IISD), Daniela is a writer for the Earth Negotiations Bulletin (ENB).

Daniela, a French-qualified lawyer admitted to the Paris Bar, has worked on a wide range of legal and political affairs in multilateral institutions, non-profit organisations, and the U.S. Government. She started her career within the United Nations systems and held assignments at the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), in Burundi and the International Labor Organization (ILO), in Italy. She gained extensive experience in bilateral and multilateral diplomacy while holding positions at the U.S. Embassy in Kabul, Afghanistan and the U.S. Mission to UNESCO in Paris, France. In the private sector, Daniela worked at Freshfields Bruckhaus Deringer LLP in its Paris international arbitration group where she focused on public international law matters and inter-State and commercial arbitration cases. Most recently, she co-directed the executive education Certificate of Advanced Studies (CAS) in Environmental Governance at the Geneva Graduate Institute.

Daniela received her BA in law from the University of Trieste (Italy) and her MA in International Relations and LL.M in International Law from London Metropolitan University (UK). Daniela speaks English, French and Italian.

## **Diarmid Campbell-Lendrum**

Head of Unit, Climate Change, Energy, and Air Quality, World Health Organization



Dr. Diarmid CAMPBELL-LENDRUM is the Head of Climate Change, Energy, and Air Quality Unit at WHO Headquarters. He has worked on the issue for over 20 years, playing key roles in the first quantitative estimates of global health impacts of climate change, resolutions of the World Health Assembly, WHO global conferences, and the expansion of WHO's climate change and health support to over 30 low- and middle-income countries. A keen cyclist, he rode from Geneva to Paris for WHO's 2nd Global Conference on Health and Climate Change and from Geneva to London to deliver the "Health Argument for Climate Action" WHO report and the "Healthy Climate Prescription" letter ahead of COP26.

## **Margarita Gutierrez**

Policy Advisor, Friends of Climate and Health, International Institute of Sustainable Development (IISD)



Mechanical Engineer with a Master's degree in Environmental Economics from Universidad de los Andes (Colombia), and specializations in Environmental Public Policy from Universidad San Pablo CEU and the London School of Economics. She has over 20 years of experience in climate change and environmental policy, including more than 12 years dedicated to the design and implementation of climate action across Latin America and the Caribbean. She is recognized for her leadership, strong capacity-building approach, and ability to develop strategic visions and innovative solutions to address complex environmental challenges.

She is a senior climate policy and adaptation expert specializing in climate adaptation, ecosystem-based adaptation, biodiversity–climate synergies, health and climate, and the mainstreaming of climate change into sectoral and development policies. Her work focuses on generating economic and social benefits through nature-based solutions and just energy transition initiatives. She currently advises on biodiversity–climate synergies and climate and health under the UNFCCC process and recently contributed to the evaluation of climate policies across Latin America with Technopolis.

She has extensive experience working with public and private sectors and civil society organizations across the region, including the design of adaptation projects and strategic advisory roles on governance structures and climate mainstreaming processes. Her experience includes advising on Adaptation Fund proposal development in the Caribbean (Belize, UNEP), coordinating a EUR 5 million IKI-funded ecosystem-based adaptation project to prevent coastal erosion in Colombia managed by KfW, and leading municipal-level assessments to support capacity building, employment, and productive initiatives aligned with the energy transition in La Guajira. She previously served as Deputy Director at The Nature Conservancy for the NASCA region, overseeing programmes in Panama and Costa Rica, and as Coordinator of the Latin America Climate Disclosure Alliance, supporting climate finance and private-sector disclosure initiatives in Mexico.

His expertise and areas of interest cover several key sectors, including agriculture and food security, disaster risk reduction, social development, public health, biodiversity, and ecosystem services.
